Thobile, Khanyi and Lindo

Thobile is a delight to have on the team. Her gentle, consistent and playful nature is one the children gravitate towards. Thobile is a single mother to a beautiful 3 year old girl called Khwezi. Thobile visited the hospitals with her mother, Toyse, in 2007 but felt very overwhelmed and distressed at seeing the pain and suffering of the children in the wards. It was only after the birth of her own daughter that she felt a change in her heart and deep calling to return to the hospital. Thobile works with Hlengiwe at Northdale hospital. Thobile is an excellent team member and has played a pivotal role in growing the programme at Northdale.

Khanyi officially joined the team in 2007 but had been volunteering with us on and off prior to this. Khanyi brings vitality and energy to the team. She is a driven woman who has shown much personal and professional growth during her time with us. Khanyi was raised by her sister in a child headed household as both her parents passed away when she was only a few years old. She feels a deep calling to the work in the hospital as a result of her own upbringing and understanding of what it is like not to have parents. Khanyi loves to connect with the children. She is a fun filled asset to the Greys Hospital team.

Lindo brings a different dynamic to the team and his Christian witness is a powerful one as culturally it is the women's responsibility to care for the children. The boys in the ward warm quickly to Lindo's caring 'big brother' nature. Lindo felt called to pray for the children in the hospitals and it was during this time that he came into contact with Mpume who encouraged him to join her in visiting and praying for the children. Lindo was not raised in a Christian family and so he feels a strong calling to share the gospel with others. He has a thirst for knowledge and for a greater revelation of Christ in his life. Lindo's playful, thoughtful ways and huge smile are a blessing to the team.

Getting Serious about Teaching: Launching of our new Education Programme

It is with great joy we announce that we have expanded our hospital work to include a structured education programme. We are thrilled that Callie-Jo A'bear ("CJ"), a qualified teacher, joined the team in February 2015 and has commenced 1-1 and small group teaching in the hospital wards. This is a project that has been on our hearts for a number of years and has been made possible by additional funding. This is unchartered territory as no other formal teaching programmes exist in the hospitals. We have decided to trial the project for a year to see if it is effective enough to continue with into the future. We are excited that a group of 5 Masters Educational and Research Psychology students have identified us as their research project for the year. They have committed to assisting us in establishing effective & culturally appropriate screening assessments and teaching materials for use in the hospitals. Our intention is to establish a programme that can then be replicated in other hospitals

We would like to extend a HUGE thank you to the Christ Church Hilton Ladies Bible Study group and Build It who have generously donated bags filled with stationery to be used in the hospital. This has been a great support to the program and gives the children the necessary resources to do their homework!



Networking with CHOC (Childhood Cancer Association of South Africa: www.choc.org.za)

The paediatric cancer ward is a ward that we have not previously been able to work in due to their strict infection control policies. The CHOC foundation offers ongoing support to these children and their families. Through our new educational programme we have established a working relationship with CHOC and the medical team in the oncology ward and CJ has the opportunity to teach these children during their hospital stays.





Introducing CJ

I love Jesus. I am in awe of how great He is, yet He is also interested in every detail of my life. People are important to me, and I love making solid, lasting friendships. I love being outdoors. The Berg mountains are my favourite place to get away to. And music keeps me going ⁽²⁾ I have always been around children, from babysitting, to teaching Sunday school, to boarder mistressing, to volunteering in children's homes. Although I love children, I did NOT want to be a teacher and vowed I would never be one. However, God had other plans. After completing my honours in Psychology, I decided I would do my PGCE, with the hopes of becoming a school counsellor. Alongside that I did an internship at The Wykeham Collegiate junior school, and I fell in love with teaching! I loved coming up with creative lessons, I loved watching children learn something new and that moment when they grasp the concept, and I loved how much love they had to offer. Yet again God had another bigger and better plan. I am so excited to be working with Zanini Bantwana, and I am expecting to see God continuing to work through us this year.

Snake Bites and Superstitions



Snake bites are a common occurrence especially during the warmer months. Most hospitals stock the anti-venom and patients are managed at their local hospital. Elpheus was bitten by a particularly poisonous snake on his right cheek while sleeping. He was rushed to hospital and fell critically ill. After a prolonged ICU stay he was referred to the wards where he continued his road to recovery. It was during this time that he participated in our activities.

Luyanda, a 7 year old girl, was bitten by a snake on her ankle while playing on a stack of fire wood with her friends. She had to go through foot reconstructive surgeries and rehabilitation to regain her mobility. She spent 2 months in hospital over Christmas and New year away from her family. She was very receptive to the teams visits and loved the creative activities.
