"Come children, listen to me and I will teach you the fear of the Lord"

It is hard to believe that it has already been 10 years since Sheena and Alan first started to visit the children in the hospitals. With your ongoing support we have interacted with and loved 1000's of children.



Moments

What a privilege it is to be called to work with these precious children. As a team we invest a lot of ourselves into the lives of these little ones and it is not uncommon for there to be tears shed when talking about or praying for their healing and personal circumstances. The hurt and suffering that we see daily is, however, punctuated with many moments which bring us such joy. It is these moments that confirm in us why we do what we do and refuel our hearts... here are just a few that come to mind from the team

- When we enter the ward we are stampeded by children with big smiles excited to see what the day's activities will be
- Toyse tells of how the children cry when she leaves and sometimes she thinks if she wasn't careful they might follow her home
- In the Burns ward there was a young boy who would not interact with any of the
 hospital staff and would not engage in therapy sessions. We were approached by a
 therapist to find out how he was responding to us during our visits. Our experience of
 him was the complete opposite, he was excited to see us and happily participated in
 the activities we brought for him to do
- It is not uncommon to see the children in F-ward standing on their beds looking out the window after lunch eagerly waiting to spot the team in blue uniforms arriving to take them away from the ward to the ZB room for an afternoon of fun, learning and games. The ZB playground with its swings and slide remains an absolute favourite!
- CJ finds it such a joy when she sees a child grasp a new concept. The delight in their faces when they finally 'get it!'
- Mpume says that she loves that we feel a part of the hospital community. The doctors will stop and ask what story we are doing this week and will sometimes ask the team to translate for them when they are speaking to a child.
- Hlengiwe and Thobile tell of how during the story of 'Jesus calms the storm' they got
 the children to make the thunder, rain and lightning sounds. A chronically ill and
 emaciated little girl who refused to eat or engage with the hospital staff responded
 wholeheartedly, making the most realistic sounds with accompanied actions. This
 was a breakthrough moment
- The nurses tell us that the children love Lindo like a father or a big brother. Some of them, although discharged, will want to finish their ZB activities before they go home







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Getting Serious about Teaching: Some news from CJ about our Education Programme

CJ writes: I can't believe we are half way through the year and that I have been with this incredible team for 5 months now! I was looking over the register I have kept with all names of the children I see, and I was amazed at the number I have seen. They have all touched my life during their stay in hospital. I only hope, I too, have touched their lives in some way.

In Oncology there have been 6 children of differing ages who have been admitted more than twice during my stay and they tend to stay for at least 2 weeks. They have been truly delightful and even though they have been so sick on their chemo days, they always manage a smile and pull out their homework - even if they haven't finished it! (these kiddies don't need to make up excuses like "my dog ate it").

In the Burns Unit there have been 4 children with whom I have been able to work for extended periods of time. The first two months I had a very sweet little grade 4 girl and a hard working grade 7 boy. We did lots of Maths together, and by the end of their stay we seemed to have conquered subtraction!

Currently, I have three boys in the Burns Unit. Although they are all in grade one, they are at very different academic levels! However, their enthusiasm inspires me to keep pushing them.

In Orthopaedics I have worked with two grade 6 girls, both leg amputees, who have been in approximately a month. Some days were hard as the pain seemed unbearable, but both of them were such determined young girls who were adamant to "do school" while they were in hospital.

These are just a few of the children I have seen; altogether, I have seen 22 children on a long term basis. Plenty more have passed through on short term stays.

We were invited as a team to speak at one of the Private Schools during their morning assembly. The team were very excited (and a little nervous too!) to share about the work that God has called us to do in the hospitals and what fun we have helping the children. We had an overwhelming response from the children as they were encouraged to think of others less privileged than themselves. We were blessed with many boxes of new and second hand toys, books and games to take to the children in the wards.

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Singakwenza recycling workshop

Together with CHOC (a charity helping with childhood cancer) our team participated in a Singakwenze toy making workshop. Bread bags became skipping ropes and balls, yogurt containers become shape sorters and milk containers became catchers. What a fun hands-on learning experience that reminded the team of how important it is for children to learn through play and that we can make toys from recycled materials in resource-poor contexts for free!



The Girl and the Red Dress

Please pray for 6 year old Lihle, her story upset us deeply. She was a victim of sexual abuse in her own home and had to be moved to a place of safety. We spent precious time with her during her hospital stay and loved her as best we could. During one interaction the team asked her if there was anything we could do or get for her, and she responded by saying that all she wanted was a red dress. She rippled with excited when Thobile dressed her in her very own red dress \odot
